One article about the mother tongue eloquently describes its holiness, the relationships nurtured in it, and the duty some individuals felt toward their mother tongue for all it had given them. And it raised the question of identity. For example: if a child of Mexican parents grows up in the USA and doesn't speak Spanish, is he or she Hispanic?

What about Igala people who grow up outside ane Igala? What I hear the most from people who can't speak or read Igala is the shame they feel. Without the language, one doesn't understand one's own culture and values; one can't enjoy the jokes and stories; one is an outsider.

Children everywhere need to study their own language. In the US, even native-born, English-speaking children must take English classes every DAY of the school year for TWELVE years. Why should we believe that a study of the Igala primer is enough for Igala-speaking children? I am convinced that we must create and implement a full curriculum for teaching reading and writing in Igala in the schools.

This is my simple action plan. It is simple but not easy. It will take a lot of work and prayer! Please add your comments and suggestions in the blank lines as we review the plan.
